## NYS Ed Law Section 3635

- Section 3635 of the Education Law requires all non-city districts to provide transportation for pupils enrolled in kindergarten through grades 8 who live more than two miles from the school they attend and for pupils enrolled in grades 9-12 who live more than three miles from the school they attend up to a distance of fifteen miles.
- Transportation for distances less than the statutory distance may be provided, if the voters approve.

> North Bellmore Voter Approved Transportation Policy 8410 and 8413

- Transportation shall be provided to those students who are in grades 4-6 living a distance greater than ONE mile from the school that they attend.
- The district will provide transportation for all $K-3$ students who live a distance greater than one-half mile from the school they attend.
- The same provisions for transportation of public school children shall apply to children within the district who attend private or parochial schools.

Difference in Mileage

- NYS Statutory Distance
- Grades K-8 - more than 2 miles
- North Bellmore UFSD
- Grades K-3 - more than $1 / 2$ mile ( $11 / 2$ miles less than statute)
- Grades 4-6 - more than 1 mile (1 mile less than statute)



## FAOs

- Student moving up to $4^{\text {th }}$ grade and no longer eligible for transportation due to mileage
- Families with multiple children in different grade levels
- One child may be eligible for transportation while a sibling is not eligible
- Struggles with getting children to school and not eligible for transportation
- Any changes to the voter approved mileage limits MUST go through a public vote.
- Separate proposition on the ballot passed by a majority of voters.


## Change in Voter Approved Policy

- Taxpayers can petition the Board of Education to place a separate referendum on the ballot to make a change to the policy.
- Additional costs related to changes in the transportation policy are included in the budget and passed on to the taxpayers through tax levy.
- Propositions related to transportation mileage limits may increase or decrease the budget.
- Decreasing the mileage limit > more students transported > increased budgetary costs
- Increasing the mileage limit > less students transported > budgetary savings
- Large increases to budgetary costs may cause the tax levy to pierce the tax cap.
- This would require a $60 \%$ supermajority for approval.
- Four school transportation propositions were included on the ballot for the 2018-2019 fiscal year.
- Proposition 2A - Change mileage limit for grades 4-6 to students living more than $1 / 2$ mile - Cost $\$ 610,000$
- Proposition 2B - Change mileage limit for grades K-6 to NYS statutory limit of students living more than 2 miles - Savings \$450,000
- Proposition 2 C - Keep current mileage limit in place, $\mathrm{K}-3$ at $1 / 2$ mile and 4-6 at 1 mile - No change to budget
- Proposition 3 - Increase mileage limit for students attending private and parochial schools from 15 miles to 17.5 miles Cost \$100,000
- Result of Vote
- Proposition 2A - Change mileage limit for grades $4-6$ to $1 / 2$ mile Cost $\$ 610,000-232$ votes $9.15 \%$
- Proposition 2B - Change mileage limit for grades K-6 to NYS statutory limit of 2 miles - Savings $\$ 450,000-854$ votes $33.68 \%$
- Proposition 2 C - Keep current mileage limit in place, $\mathrm{K}-3$ at $1 / 2$ mile and $4^{-6}$ at 1 mile - No change to budget $-1,450$ votes 57.18\%
- Proposition 3 - Increase mileage limit for students attending private and parochial schools from 15 miles to 17.5 miles - Cost $\$ 100,000-452$ yes / 1982 no
- 2018/19 Annual Budget - Failed
- The budget had the majority vote, but did not meet the supermajority vote requirement of $60 \%$.
- Revote of same budget in June 2018 - Passed with majority vote.
- 2018-2019 Referendum
- Change mileage limit for grades 4-6 to $1 / 2$ mile
- Cost \$610,000
- Transportation costs have increased by over 60\% since 2018-2019
- 45\% increase from 2022-2023 to 2023-2024
- Cost to change mileage for grades 4-6 to $1 / 2$ mile will generate approximately over $\$ 1 \mathrm{M}$ in cost.


## Cost of Changes

- Cost to change to transportation for all can cost in excess of $\$ 2 \mathrm{M}$ approximately.
- If a referendum is brought to the Board of Education for a public vote, a full analysis for costs will be completed based on the mileage limits proposed.
- A non-allowable pupil decimal is recomputed every three years to determine the district's transportation aid ratio.
- Generally, non-allowable pupils are non-disabled pupils who live $11 / 2$ miles or less from the school attended and are being transported.


## State <br> Transportation <br> Aid Ratio - <br> Current 65.3\%

- The district currently has non-allowable pupils due to the district policy having distance limits of less than $11 / 2$ miles.
- The number of non-allowable pupils will increase if mileage decreases as this will provide transportation for more students living less than 1 $1 / 2$ miles, thereby increasing the non-allowable pupil decimal and reducing the district's transportation aid ratio.



## Summary

- Current Mileage Limit:
- Grades K-3-more than $1 / 2$ mile
- Grades 4-6 - more than 1 mile
- How to Change Limits
- MUST go through a public vote
- Taxpayers may petition the Board of Education to include a referendum proposal for the change requested on the annual vote.
- Possible Effect on Budget
- Increased budget - may require a supermajority to pass
- Possible Effect on State Aid
- Increased non-allowable pupil decimal > reduction in transportation state aid ratio > reduction in state aid revenue
- Possible Effect on Taxpayers
- Increased tax levy - Taxpayers pay for the change to the transportation policy
