TREASURER'S REPORT	Mrs. Lanci moved that the Board of Education approve the Treasurer's report for the month ended April 30, 2022. Mrs. Malloy seconded and the motion was carried 3-0.
BOARD COMMITTEE / HIGH SCHOOL REPORTS	Mrs. Lanci reported the Board met last Tuesday and it too was an exciting evening. She shared they had the privilege to honor the Valedictorians and Salutatorians, and happily announced that prom was being held this evening in celebration of the graduating class of 2022. The Senior Award Ceremony was on May 25, and she thanked all who have supported the scholarships throughout the years. In furtherance of the celebrations, Mrs. Lanci shared BMCHSD honored the retirement of eighteen faculty/staff who had a combined service of 433 years, and recognized the retiring PTAs and other members of the educational community. In addition to the normal course of business, Mrs. Lanci indicated there was a report on school security updates and the approval of the re-organization meeting date of July 17.
FINANCE	The Board of Education acknowledged the review of the warrants that have been approved by the Claims Auditor for the month of May 2022.
	Mrs. Lanci moved that the Board of Education approve the Budgetary Transfers dated June 9, 2022. Mrs. Malloy seconded, and the motion was carried 3-0.
SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Public Hearing: North Bellmore District Wide Safety Plan 2022/23	Mrs. Testa began by reflecting on the current state of the nation and solemnly spoke to the recent school tragedy that occurred in Texas. She assured that the security and safety of the students, faculty, and staff is at the heart of the work in North Bellmore. In furtherance, Mrs. Testa presented a power point presentation illustrating an overview of the safety and security protocols currently existing district wide:
	• Video surveillance stations are present in strategic areas in the district for visualization by staff, homeland security, fire and police departments in the event of an emergency situation within the district.
	 The district has its own Homeland Security officer assigned to us who is familiar with our safety protocols and practices, and works in partnership with emergency and law enforcement agencies, and NCPD Pop officers who serve our district.
	 All exterior doors are locked and closed at all times with key and swipe access only. In the case of an emergency, the swipe system can immediately be deactivated. Faculty and staff are briefed on the importance of this.
	 Lockdown/lockout, and fire safety drills are performed periodically district wide, and an assessment of them is conducted among those on the Safety and Security Team.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: Public Hearing: North	 All Administrators are trained and have the RAVE Mobile notification system for notification of emergency personnel in and outside of the district of a serious emergency situation.
Bellmore District Wide Safety Plan 2022/23 <i>(continued)</i>	 Security guards are present in each building and are trained in the safety protocols. They monitor and surveil the grounds, screen all visitors, and can notify administrators district wide of a possible emergency situation.
	 The security vestibules at Park, Newbridge, and Martin are constructed, and those at Saw Mill and Dinkelmeyer will be completed this summer. These vestibules prevent visitors from accessing entry into the buildings without proper security clearance. Any modifications to arrival/dismissal procedures will be addressed on a building-by-building basis.
	With respect to the school grounds, Mrs. Testa spoke to the enhancement of fencing. She was happy to share the grant application in response to this was approved, the required paperwork by the District was submitted, and indicated additional fencing and gates will be installed once the funds are received.
	Looking ahead, Mrs. Testa reported Mr. Fischetti is assessing options and feasibility of a door ajar notification system. She did share previously this type of system was considered but with technological advancements it is being revisited. Continuing with surveillance and monitoring, Mrs. Testa offered her gratitude to Mr. Fischetti in facilitating the installation of additional interior cameras and the modification and replacement of existing cameras.
	In closing, Mrs. Testa indicated that in response to the Public Hearing this evening on school wide safety, the North Bellmore District Wide Safety Plan for 2022/23 will be posted on the website for the required 30- day public review and commentary period.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT	Motion was made by Mrs. Lanci to approve the Staff Development Report dated June 9, 2022. Mrs. Malloy seconded, and the motion was carried 3-0.

BUSINESS DEPARTMENT REPORT	Mrs. Rehak thanked the community for passing the budget. She was excited to share the District is already working closely with the architect and the state, and letters of intent have been sent in preparation for the ceiling and pavement projects. The goal she explained is to go to bid sometime between the fall and winter months for a proposed timeline of work to begin the summer of 2023.
	Mrs. Rehak, returning to the issue of safety and security, addressed the Nassau County School Bus Stop Arm Safety Program. Mrs. Rehak previously reported on the proposed plan back in November, and reiterated the program was implemented at the start of this fiscal year in Suffolk County and is still currently utilized there. The program she indicated was developed to address the illegal and dangerous action of motorists passing a stopped school bus discharging and/or loading passengers.
	Mrs. Rehak shared the program will be launched in Nassau County effective September of 2022. Currently she said 35 districts have already opted into the program to have stop arm cameras installed on their buses which will detect and capture the license plates of vehicles that pass school buses while the arm is open and lights are flashing. Also, as an extra level of security, she indicated cameras will be installed on the interior of the buses and footage would be accessible if needed.
	Mrs. Rehak explained that during the month of September motorists will receive warning only violations, and fines will be issued thereafter. She did indicate the program is funded by the revenues received from the violations and is at no cost to the district. In addition to the four buses currently owned by the district, Mrs. Rehak shared the willingness of Guardian to install the cameras on their buses.
	In conclusion, Mrs. Rehak indicated if the district is interested in this program, it will be included on next month's agenda for discussion and approval. She did note, however, if a discontinuance of the program in the future is desired after implementation, the cameras could be uninstalled and returned at no cost to the district.
	Mrs. Lanci did inquire if the district decided to opt into the program and then subsequently decided after a couple of months to opt out, is there a minimum period for this to occur i.e., six months, a year. Mrs. Rehak responded she will verify if there is a required timeframe.
	Mrs. Cmar-Grote indicated reports from Curriculum, Technology, and Special Education Reports were tabled for this evening.

PUBLIC COMMENTS Ms. Ciancarelli (Mona Court) – When will fencing be installed (especially at the Saw Mill School), on the playground side of Saw Mill Road where it's all open and very accessible to strangers on the street while kids are at recess. Mrs. Cmar-Grote responded by reiterating what was previously stated in Mrs. Testa's report that the district is currently awaiting receipt of the funds from the grant. Mrs. Testa, echoing Mrs. Cmar-Grote, reiterated the necessary paperwork has been filed, described diligent efforts to follow-up on the status, and thanked Ms. Ciancarelli for the inquiry. Ms. Ciancarelli (Mona Court) – I know Massapegua has armed guards and it's costly and maybe it's not something our community could agree on or even have budgeted for, but what about asking the police precinct to set up a rotation of cops to sit and visit our schools instead of parking in random spots for their lunch or break. Can they go to one of our schools and just show a presence? As a *community we would greatly appreciate that.* Mrs. Testa responded by describing the increased presence of the Nassau County Police Department at random locations outside the North Bellmore Schools as well as other areas within the neighborhood. In furtherance of this, Mrs. Testa spoke to a pending meeting at the Morrelly Center on June 13 to further review the safety protocols within the districts and countywide. Ms. Holmes (Logue Street) – Re. Safety and security – one of the teachers who survived the Uvalde shooting expressed that he followed the active shooter training and directed his students to follow protocol. The teacher stated the training failed because it set up his students as "ducks in a row" for the shooter. Has the district considered modifying/changing the active shooter lockdown protocol in response to Uvalde shooting possibly including evacuating out of the rescue windows? Also, has the district looked into buying bulletproof classroom doors and/or some type of bulletproof "shield" that the children can hide behind? Mrs. Testa responded that the district is required to follow New York State regulations with regard to lockdown/lockout drills and currently there is no change with regard to the regulations that the district must follow and would keep the Board apprised of any modifications to the protocol. With respect to bullet proof glass, Mrs. Testa responded the district has been advised not to disclose such information as it could be a potential safety breach. **ADJOURNMENT** On a motion by Mrs. Lanci, seconded by Mrs. Malloy, and carried 3-0, the Board of Education meeting was adjourned at 11:08 p.m. The next Business Meeting/ Reorganization meeting will be held on Thursday, July 7, 2022.
